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Plan of Organization and Rules of Order for the General Conference

PREAMBLE

From the days of John Wesley, the "People called Methodist" have gathered for holy 4 conferencing. The early Methodists, even as they attended to practical needs of the 5 movement, focused primarily on spiritual matters. The spiritual affairs of the Church and 6 its mission are always before the body whether or not they are apparent in the passions of 7 debate on temporal concerns. Through Christian conferencing the Church comes 8 together, seeking unity in the midst of diversity, always desiring to know the mind of 9 Christ. The General Conference is the representative, deliberative body for The United 10 Methodist Church. It has developed an orderly, rational, and fair process for making 11 majority decisions in the practical affairs of the Church; yet, it also protects the rights of 12 minority positions. The delegates come together in firm conviction that the unity of 13 United Methodism is God's will and the best way to "spread scriptural holiness" in this 14 global movement of the Church. 15

The purpose of the Plan of Organization and Rules of Order is to help the General
Conference discern God's will and strive for Christ-like wisdom in all of our decisions. in
the midst of theological and spiritual tension and to focus on God's will for us amid the
conflicting issues of the day. The General Conference must be open to discern
prayerfully God's will for us. There will be times, in the midst of deliberation, when we
will need to stop In the midst of deliberation, we may pause, listen in silence, pray
together, and refocus our common vision on where the Spirit is leading the Church.

24	These times of silence, prayer, and discernment may be varied and surprising. While
25	they are not substitutes for respectful and orderly debate, they do serve to hold our
26	temporal affairs up to the light of the larger, common mission of The United Methodist
27	Church to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. Trusting
28	that God is at work throughout all of life, creation, the church invites the public the
29	General Conference invites the Church and others to observe its our deliberations by
30	conducting its our business in open meetings (consistent with \P 721 of the Book of
31	Discipline)."

33	PLAN OF ORGANIZATION
34	
35	I. Opening Session and Organization
36	The General Conference will assemble at the set time and place beginning with worship.
37	on the day fixed at the place designated in accordance with the action taken by the
38	preceding General Conference or the Commission on the General Conference. Holy
39	Communion and the Memorial Service shall be celebrated by the Conference, led by the
40	Council of Bishops. During the Memorial Service, the names of the bishops, and
41	bishops' spouses who have died since the adjournment of the preceding General
42	Conference, and the names of the delegates elect who have died shall be called.
43	The opening business session of the Conference shall be on the day at the hour fixed by
44	the Commission on the General Conference and shall be called to order by the bishop
45	designated, as provided in the Book of Discipline ¶16.11.

47	The following order of business shall be observed:
48	A. Roll Call. The record of attendance shall be made in writing to the Secretary of
49	the General Conference by:
50	1) The Secretary of the Council of Bishops for the bishops,
51	2) The Secretary of the Judicial Council for that body,
52	3) The Executive Secretary of the Connectional Table for all general secretaries,
53	4) The chairperson of each delegation for its membership. (See Rule 5), and
54	5) The chairperson of the each delegation for Affiliated Autonomous Methodist
55	and United Churches delegations.
56	B. Establish the bar of the conference.
57	C. Report of The Plan of Organization and Rules of Order.
58	<u>ĐC</u> . Report of the Commission on the General Conference.
59	1) Adoption of The Plan of Organization and Rules of Order
60	\underline{ED} . Elections
61	1) Coordinator of Calendar (See IV.C)
62	F <u>E</u> . Report of Committee on Agenda.
63	GF. Miscellaneous Business.
64	HG. Adjournment.

66	II. Episcopal, Laity, and Young People Addresses
67	The Quadrennial Addresses shall be delivered early in the Conference, at such hour as
68	determined by the Commission on the General Conference. The Council of Bishops shall
69	coordinate the preparation and presentation of the Quadrennial Episcopal Address. The

70	Association of Annual Conference Lay Leaders shall coordinate the preparation and
71	presentation of the Quadrennial Lay Address from submissions by annual conference lay
72	leaders. This opportunity shall be open to all annual conference lay leaders-in Africa,
73	Asia, Europe, and North America. The United Methodist Division of Ministries with
74	Young People shall coordinate the preparation and presentation of the Quadrennial
75	Young People Address. This opportunity shall be open to all young people-in Africa,
76	Asia, Europe, and North America.
77	
78	III. Presiding Officers
79	The presiding officers for the several plenaries of the Conference, the opening plenary
80	excepted (See Section I, above), shall be chosen from among the effective bishops by the
81	Committee on Presiding Officers (See Section VIIA.6).
82	
83	IV. Secretary of the General Conference
84	A. The Secretary of the General Conference shall be responsible for all functions of
85	the office assigned by ¶504.3 in preparation for the session of the General
86	Conference, and shall be accountable to the Commission on the General
87	Conference.
88	B. The Secretary of the General Conference shall select persons from the clergy and
89	lay membership of The United Methodist Church to serve on the secretarial
90	support staff.
91	C. The Conference shall elect, upon nomination by the Secretary of the General
92	Conference, a Coordinator of Calendar, who shall assist the Committee on

93		Agenda and Calendar in presenting reports in such order as to expedite the
94		business of the Conference, and in other responsibilities of the committee (See
95		I.E.1 and VII.A.1).
96	D.	The Secretary of the General Conference shall appoint a Petitions Secretary who
97		shall prepare the petitions, resolutions, and reports that meet the requirements of
98		Book of Discipline $\P507$ for reference to the appropriate legislative committee,
99		subject to review by the Committee on Reference (See Section VII.A.7.). For a
100		single petition signed by a number of people, the Secretary of the General
101		Conference needs to print only the name of the first signer with an indication of
102		the total number of signers. Petitions submitted by general agencies and/or
103		conferences shall have all of those sources identified. Substantially identical
104		petitions received from other sources shall be identified by number of petitions
105		received.
106	E.	A budget for the work of the Secretary of the General Conference shall be
107		presented by the Commission on the General Conference to the General Council
108		on Finance and Administration. Such budget shall be paid out of the General
109		Administration Fund.
110	F.	If in the interim of the quadrennial sessions of the General Conference the office
111		of the Secretary of the General Conference shall be vacated for any reason, the
112		Council of Bishops shall elect a successor to serve until the next session.
113		
114		V. Nominations and Elections

115	The Secretary of the General Conference shall develop a timeline for the submission of
116	nominations, elections and appointments by the Council of Bishops. In making these
117	nominations, elections and appointments, attention shall be given to ensuring continuity
118	of membership from the previous quadrennium. It shall be the responsibility of the
119	Council of Bishops to present nominations for the Commission on the General
120	Conference, Standing Committee on Central Conference Matters, General Conference
121	administrative committees, and secretary-designate of the General Conference. These
122	nominations shall be presented to the General Conference for election.

124	Disciplinary provisions shall govern the nomination and election procedures for:

136	The Daily Christian Advocate shall publish the list of nominees for election to the
137	Judicial Council and the University Senate. Biographical sketches not to exceed 100
138	words in length shall be submitted by each nominee and shall be published as submitted.
139	
140	VI. Commission on the General Conference
141	A. There shall be a Commission on the General Conference comprised of lay and
142	clergy membership as defined by ¶511 of The Book of Discipline. They shall
143	have oversight responsibility for all arrangements necessary for the meeting of the
144	General Conference.
145	composed of twenty-five (25) members as follows: two persons from each
146	jurisdiction, one person from the central conferences of each continent of Africa,
147	Asia, and Europe, one young adult, the chairperson of the host committee, and ten
148	(10) additional members. The additional members shall be allocated to reflect the
149	proportionate jurisdictional membership based upon combined clergy and lay
150	membership of the church. With the exception of the chairperson of the host
151	committee, members shall be nominated from the elected delegates to the General
152	Conference by the Council of Bishops at its fall meeting preceding General
153	Conference and elected by the General Conference for a term of eight years. The
154	Commission shall be equally divided between clergy and lay membership to the
155	extent possible. Approximately half of the Commission shall be elected by the
156	General Conference each quadrennium. If vacancies occur, the Council of
157	Bishops shall elect geographically appropriate successors to serve through the
158	next session of the General Conference and then nominate for election by the
159	General Conference persons to serve any remainder term. The Secretary of the
160	General Conference, the Treasurer of the General Council on Finance and
161	Administration, the Business Manager of the General Conference, and a bishop
162	named by the Council of Bishops shall also be ex-officio members without vote.
163	The Council of Bishops shall designate one of its members to convene and
164	organize the Commission for the coming quadrennium before the adjournment of
165	the General Conference.
166	At the organizational meeting, an executive team comprised of a chairperson, a vice-
167	chairperson, and a secretary shall be elected. The remaining members of the
168	executive team shall be the chairperson of the host committee, the Bishop serving
169	on the Commission, the Secretary of the General Conference, the Business
170	Manager of the General Conference, and the chairperson and secretary elected by
171	the Committee on the Plan of Organization and Rules of Order. The Commission
172	shall organize a Committee on the Plan of Organization and Rules of Order from

150	within its membership. The commonition of the committee shall be determined by
173	within its membership. The composition of the committee shall be determined by
174	the Commission. The Committee shall be organized at the initial meeting of the
175	Commission following General Conference. It shall elect its own chairperson and
176	secretary, who will serve on the Commission's executive team.
177	B. The first Commission on the General Conference to be elected shall have half its
178	members nominated from persons currently serving non-expiring terms from the
179	current Commission on the General Conference and Committee on the Plan of
180	Organization and Rules of Order. Persons nominated from both of these current
181	groups shall serve a term of four years, expiring at the adjournment of the
182	subsequent General Conference. The remaining members shall be new nominees
183	and shall serve for a full eight year term. The members of the 2005-2008
184	Commission on the General Conference and the Committee on the Plan of
185	Organization and Rules of Order will continue to serve until the adjournment of
186	the 2008 General Conference.
187	C. This Commission shall determine the place and time (within such limits as may
188	be set up by the General Conference) of the next General Conference and shall
189	send an official notice to all elected delegates announcing specifically the opening
190	day and hour of the General Conference and anticipated time of adjournment. It
191	shall further advise the General Conference delegates in advance of all such
192	special events and orders of the day, the dates and times of which have been
193	determined prior to the opening of the General Conference, in order that the
194	delegates may have an overview of the General Conference program. The
195	Commission shall make all necessary arrangements, including arrangements for
196	the publication of the Daily Christian Advocate and quadrennial reports of the
197	Connectional Table and the general agencies of the church, to be published by the
198	United Methodist Publishing House.
199	The Daily Christian Advocate shall print the list of nominees for election to
200	the Judicial Council and the University Senate. Biographical sketches not to
201	exceed 100 words in length shall be submitted for each nominee and shall be
202	printed as submitted for each nominee.
203	D. Duties of the Committee on the Plan of Organization and Rules of Order
204	1. The Commission shall refer to this committee any proposed amendments to
205	the Plan of Organization and Rules of Order (See Rule 39). Any other matters
206	relating to parliamentary order or procedure in the business of the General
207	Conference may be referred to this committee.
208	2. The Committee shall study the Plan of Organization and Rules of Order and
209	make needed changes and adaptations to be presented to the entire
210	Commission on General Conference for final approval. After printing in the
211	Advance Daily Christian Advocate, the Commission shall present the Plan of
212	Organization and Rules of Order to the General Conference for consideration
213	and final action, same to be published in the <i>Daily Christian Advocate</i> which
214	serves as the Journal of the General Conference.
215	3. The Plan of Organization and Rules of Order of the General Conference shall
216	be those published in the Journal of the preceding General Conference until
217	they have been altered or modified by action of the General Conference (<i>Book</i>
218	of Discipline ¶ 505).

225		Advocate will be printed published in English, French, and Portuguese. The

228		be offered in French, Portuguese, Spanish, Swahili, German, Russian, Korean,
229		and American Sign Language based upon delegate's need and/or others as
230		determined by the Commission on the General Conference in consultation
231		with the Multilingual Resources of the General Board of Global Ministries.
232	2.	Duly credentialed interpreters or other personal assistants In providing
233		accommodation for persons with special needs, personal assistants, or
234		interpreters may be seated when necessary with voting delegates in all
235		committee and plenary sessions.
236	F. Tl	the Commission shall plan the schedule for the opening day of the Conference.
237		e Commission shall recommend to the General Conference the per diem
238		lowance to be paid to the elected delegates (See Section IX).
239		ne Secretary of the General Conference, on behalf of the Commission on the
240 241		eneral Conference, shall issue invitations to ecumenical representatives after posultation with the Council of Bishops and the General Commission on
241		bristian Unity and Interreligious Concerns. The Commission shall arrange for
243		cal hospitality and presentation of ecumenical representatives to the General
244	-	onference.
245		the Commission is authorized to select the site of the General Conference up to
246	10	ur quadrennia in advance.

247 248 249 250 251	J. The General Secretary of the General Council on Finance and Administration shall confer with the Commission on the General Conference through its chairperson concerning the selection and performance review of the Business Manager of the General Conference.
252	VII. Committees
253	The General Conference shall have the standing committees and special committees as it
254	may order hereinafter indicated, with such functions, responsibilities, and limitations as
255	assigned. respectively as are hereinafter prescribed, and such special committees as it
256	may order.
257	
258	A. Administrative Committees
259	The members of the following committees shall be appointed by the Council of
260	Bishops at its fall meeting preceding the General Conference. All except the
261	Committee on Correlation and Editorial Revision shall be from the elected delegates
262	to the General Conference (See Section V). Members of administrative committees
263	that meet prior to the day on which the General Conference convenes shall receive the
264	delegate per diem for each additional day on which their attendance is required.
265	Delegates who are appointed to such committees less than 60 days prior to the
266	opening session of General Conference shall be entitled to reimbursement for any
267	additional transportation costs.
268	
269	1) Agenda and Calendar
270	(a) There shall be a Committee on Agenda and Calendar composed of ten
271	eleven members, at least five of whom shall be laypersons, to be

272	constituted as follows: one from each jurisdiction, one from the central
273	conferences of each of the continents of Africa, Asia, and Europe, the
274	Coordinator of the Calendar, and the chairperson or substitute for the
275	Chairperson of the Program Committee of the Commission on the General
276	Conference or designee, and the Chairperson of the Commission on
277	General Conference or designee. Beginning in 2016, there shall be a
278	Committee on Agenda and Calendar composed of fifteen members, one
279	from each central conference and jurisdiction, at least six of whom shall
280	be laypersons; the Coordinator of the Calendar; the Chairperson of the
281	Program Committee of the Commission on the General Conference or
282	designee; and the Chairperson of the Commission on the General
283	Conference or designee. No member of the committee shall be
284	chairperson of a legislative committee or a staff person of any general
285	agency. The Committee shall be convened, for the purpose of
286	organization, by the Secretary of the General Conference, or designee, at
287	least the day before the opening of the General Conference. Following the
288	presentation and adoption of the report of the Commission on the General
289	Conference at the opening session of the General Conference, the
290	Committee on Agenda and Calendar shall immediately become
291	responsible for guiding the order of business of the Conference.
292	(b) The Committee on Agenda and Calendar shall:
293	(1) Present calendar reports in such an order as to expedite the business of
294	the Conference,

295	(2) Inform the bishop presiding as soon as possible of the agenda items,
296	including order of priority, to be considered,
297	(3) Keep an overview of calendar progress;
298	(4) Report recommendations to each session of the General Conference
299	concerning business agenda, including time allocation and order in
300	which legislative committee reports shall be presented;
301	(5) Give priority in plenary for legislative consideration as calendar items
302	become available: first to items affecting the global church, second to
303	items with financial implications, and third to items with minority
304	<u>reports;</u>
305	(6) Give priority to calendar items involving minority reports;
306	(76) Announce, at the last plenary session of each day, a tentative
307	agenda for the next day;
308	(87) Consult daily with the legislative committee chairpersons to
309	expedite the business of the General Conference; and
310	(98) Receive all requests for special orders of the day, except those
311	requested in the report of the Commission on the General Conference
312	on the first day of the Conference.
313	(c) Proposals, questions, communications, resolutions, and other matters not
314	included in the regular business of the General Conference shall be
315	referred to the Committee on Agenda and Calendar without motion or
316	debate. This committee shall determine whether the matter presented shall
317	be considered by the General Conference. Appeal from the decision of

- 318this committee may be presented to the Conference upon the written319signature of twenty delegates, and the A decision of this committee may320be appealed by submitting to the conference the signatures of ten321delegates. The item shall be presented to the Conference if the appeal is322supported by a one-third vote.
- 323

2) Correlation and Editorial Revision

- There shall be a Committee on Correlation and Editorial Revision of four persons and two alternates not delegates to the General Conference, and the Book Editor <u>or designee</u>, who shall be an ex-officio member. They shall be entitled to reimbursement of expenses for attendance at meetings of the committee. The Book Editor <u>or designee</u> shall convene the committee for the purpose of organization. The function of this committee shall be:
- (a) To review all proposed legislation reported in the *Daily Christian Advocate* or presented in special reports to the General Conference. The
 Committee shall report to the committees concerned, or to the General
 Conference as the situation may warrant, all contradictions, duplications,
 and inconsistencies discovered.
- (b) To assure that, when a calendar item approved on the Consent Calendar or
 under an omnibus vote is found to be in conflict with parts of another
 calendar item discussed and voted upon at a plenary session, the item
 discussed and voted shall prevail.
- 340 (c) To edit the *Book of Discipline* in accordance with Section X.B.

3) Courtesies and Privileges 342 There shall be a Committee on Courtesies and Privileges of eight members 343 composed of one delegate from each jurisdiction and one delegate from a central 344 conference from each of the continents of Africa, Asia, and Europe. Beginning in 345 2016, there shall be a Committee on Courtesies and Privileges composed of 346 twelve members, one from each central conference and jurisdiction, at least six of 347 whom shall be lay persons. The committee shall be convened by a bishop for the 348 purpose of organization. The committee has the following duties and 349 responsibilities: 350 (a) To consider matters of privilege and, if they are such, to recommend to the 351 Conference that they be heard. 352 (b) To consider resolutions of commendation, courtesy, appreciation, etc., 353 354 submitted in writing by delegates. The committee may initiate similar resolutions and may edit and amend those submitted to it. Resolutions 355 approved by the committee shall be printed published in the *Daily* 356 357 *Christian Advocate* and brought to the floor if the committee considers them of unusual importance or urgency. 358 (c) To arrange for extending appropriate courtesies of the Conference. 359 (d) To limit its report, including the statement of the chairperson and the 360 hearing of such persons as may be presented, to a maximum of ten 361 minutes in any one business day. No person or persons shall be presented 362 whose request has been denied by the Commission on the General 363

364	Conference, nor after the sixth day unless approved by a two-thirds vote of
365	the Conference (See Rule 29.5).
366	
367	4) Credentials
368	There shall be a Committee on Credentials of eight members, composed of one
369	delegate from each jurisdiction and one delegate selected from a central
370	conference from each of the continents of Africa, Asia, and Europe. Beginning in
371	2016, there shall be a Committee on Credentials composed of twelve members,
372	one from each central conference and jurisdiction, at least six of whom shall be
373	laypersons. The committee shall be convened by a bishop for the purpose of
374	organization. The chairpersons of the respective annual conference delegations
375	shall report to this committee on a form provided for that purpose any change in
376	seating of delegates, indicating the length of time for which the change shall be
377	effective. The chairperson of this committee shall make a daily written report to
378	the Secretary of the General Conference, listing all changes of seating approved
379	by the committee. If questions arise regarding the eligibility of seating any
380	delegates, this committee shall report directly to the General Conference with its
381	recommendations (See Rule 5). The committee shall provide guidance to the
382	Secretary of the General Conference regarding the approval of credentials of
383	delegates, and may review decisions regarding the seating of delegates, including
384	reserve delegates. The committee shall report to the General Conference its
385	decisions and recommendations regarding challenges to the seating of any
386	delegates.

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388 5) Journal

389	There shall be a Committee on the Journal of three delegates to approve daily the
390	record of Proceedings of the General Conference prepared by the Secretary of the
391	General Conference and assistant(s). The committee shall be convened by a
392	bishop for the purpose of organization.

393

6) Presiding Officers

There shall be a Committee on Presiding Officers of sixteen members, composed 395 of one clergy and one lay delegate from each jurisdiction, and one clergy and one 396 lay delegate from central conferences from each of the continents of Africa, Asia, 397 and Europe. Beginning in 2016, there shall be a Committee on Presiding Officers 398 composed of twelve members, one from each central conference and jurisdiction, 399 400 six of whom shall be clergy and six of whom shall be laypersons. The Committee shall be convened by a bishop for the purpose of organization. The Committee 401 shall select and notify the presiding officer(s) of each plenary session at least 24 402 403 hours in advance, insofar as possible. The Committee shall be free to select a bishop for more than one session and to change the presiding officer during the 404 405 session, whenever it seems advisable (See Section III).

406

407 **7) Reference**

There shall be a Committee on Reference of sixteen members, composed of one clergy and one lay delegate from each jurisdiction, and one clergy and one lay

410	delegate from a central conference from each of the continents of Africa, Asia,
411	and Europe. Beginning in 2016, there shall be a Committee on Reference
412	composed of twenty-four members, one clergy and one lay person from each
413	central conference and jurisdiction. The membership of this Committee shall
414	include at least one member from each legislative committee who will be
415	designated as petition coordinator for their legislative committee. If possible,
416	petition coordinators should have served previously on a General Conference
417	legislative committee. These petition coordinators shall serve as advisors to the
418	officers of the legislative committee of which they are members. Additional
419	members from the Committee on Reference shall assist the petition coordinator in
420	the legislative committee of which they are members. This committee shall be
421	convened, for the purpose of organization, by the Secretary of the General
422	Conference, or designee, the day prior to the opening of the General Conference.
423	
424	(a) After reviewing the proposed assignments by the Secretary of the General
425	Conference to committees of the petitions, resolutions, and similar
426	communications dealing with the regular business of the Conference to
427	legislative committees, this committee shall refer the same to the
428	appropriate legislative committees (See Section IV.D). This Committee
429	shall also be responsible for reviewing the assignment, by the Secretary of
430	the General Conference, of all reports, recommendations, and resolutions
431	from general agencies, standing or special commissions and committees,
432	and all other communications which are submitted to the Secretary of the

433	General Conference after the convening of the General Conference, all of
434	which shall be referred directly to appropriate legislative committees
435	without presentation to a plenary session of the General Conference.
436	(b) The Committee on Reference may withdraw an item that has been
437	assigned to a committee, either upon a request or upon its own motion. It
438	may also withhold from reference or publication any document it shall
439	deem improper.
440	(c) The Secretary of the General Conference, or the Petitions Secretary, may
441	withhold from publication any petitions deemed defamatory to a private
442	individual or obscene. The Committee on Reference shall review all such
443	decisions.
444	(d) Where the Committee finds two or more substantially identical petitions, it
445	may group them under one title and number, indicating the total number of
446	petitions.
447	(e) No petitions shall be assigned by the Committee on Reference to any
448	General Conference committee unless they meet the requirements of the
449	Book of Discipline.
450	B. Committee on Ethics
451	There shall be a Committee on Ethics, comprised of the members of the Committee
452	of the Plan of Organization and Rules of Order of the General Conference. Individual
453	delegates may report their concerns about alleged violations of the rules to the
454	Secretary of the General Conference who shall investigate and attempt to resolve all
455	such claims or, based on their severity, refer them to the Committee on Ethics.

456	Alleged violations of the rules may also be referred directly to the Committee on
457	Ethics by a one-fifth vote of the Plenary. The Committee on Ethics shall review all
458	matters referred to it and report its findings to the Plenary with recommended action.
459	
460	B <u>C</u> . Standing Committee on Central Conference Matters
461	(For membership, see <i>Book of Discipline</i> ¶2201.)
462	To this Committee shall be referred all petitions, resolutions, etc., relating to the

DE. Membership of Legislative Committees.

1) Each delegate serves as a member of one of the legislative committees 740 numbered one to thirteen. Within the annual conference delegation, each 741 delegate shall choose from the one legislative committees, one to thirteen, the 742 committee on which to serve, the choice being made in order of election. 743 744 Beginning with 2004 In 2012, the clergy first elected, shall be entitled to the 745 first choice, the lay delegate first elected, the second choice, and thus the right 746 of choice shall continue to alternate between clergy and lay delegates in the 747 order of their election. For subsequent General Conferences, first choice shall 748 alternate between the lay and clergy delegates, provided two members of a 749 delegation may not serve on any one of the above designated same legislative 750 committees one to thirteen unless the said delegation is represented on each all 751 of them. All delegations composed of 14 or more delegates shall assign all 752 753 delegates in excess of 13 according to this same principle of distribution. (For example, a conference with 16 delegates shall have two delegates on each of 754 755 any three of these 13 committees and one on each of the remaining 10. 756 Similarly, a conference with 28 delegates shall have three delegates on each of two committees and two on each of the remaining 11. Each delegate may, in 757 the order herein indicated, select any one of these 13 committees, provided the 758 foregoing division of the delegates among the committees is maintained.) 759 760 Whenever a delegation has more than one delegate on a legislative committee, its delegates shall be divided as equally as possible between lay and clergy. 761

Thus, if there are three delegates on a committee, they shall be two clergy and

762

763		one lay or vice versa. The Secretary of the General Conference shall provide
764		these instructions and examples with the election of delegate instructions sent
765		to each annual conference secretary.

The election of chairperson, vice-chairperson, and 811 secretary, and sub-committee chairpersons of each committee, shall be 812 elected by separate sequential written ballot for each position., with due 813 Due consideration shall be given for inclusiveness that reflects the global 814 nature of the church, including gender, age, ethnicity, geography, young 815 people, clergy, and lay. If no election by simple majority vote of those 816 voting has occurred after three (3) consecutive ballots, the floor will be 817 reopened for nominations. 818
- (b) Training. The Secretary of the General Conference shall be responsible 819 for training all chairpersons, vice-chairpersons, and secretaries, and sub-820 committee chairpersons of legislative committees. The training shall 821 822 include instruction in their duties, all procedures in the handling of petitions, the times of the daily deadline for publishing reports, and other 823 information to expedite the work of the committees. The Commission on 824 825 the General Conference shall arrange for a time and place for such a training session. No officer shall serve without completing this training. 826 (c) Parliamentarians. Each legislative committee shall be assigned a 827 parliamentarian by the Secretary of the General Conference. Retired 828
- Bishops nominated by the Council of Bishops shall be included in the pool of parliamentarians. It shall be the responsibility of the Business Manager of the General Conference to develop a pool of other people not currently

832	delegates to serve as parliamentarians. It is preferred that these persons be
833	members of The United Methodist Church, have knowledge of the Rules
834	of the General Conference, and have training in parliamentary procedure.
835	The retired bishops shall be given priority in being assigned to legislative

846	Conference shall remain unfinished and legislative committees shall be

848	e) Sub-Committees. Legislative committees may divide into sub-committees

Meals and lodging shall be reimbursed up to the established General 933 Conference per diem. When the round trip exceeds 1,000 miles for any one round 934 trip, the cost of transportation shall be paid either on the actual costs as defined 935 936 above or at the most economical airfare available plus airport-related ground transportation cost, whichever is less. 1080	(1) The presiding officer of their respective body (plenary, administrative

points of order. raised by the delegates and shall rule on points of order not raised 1082 by delegates, as the presiding officer deems necessary to conform to these rules of 1083 order, subject in both cases to an appeal to the body by any delegate A delegate 1084 may appeal the ruling to the body without debate, except that the presiding officer 1085 and the appellant, in the order here named, shall each have three minutes for a 1086 statement in support of their respective positions. A tie vote in the case of appeal 1087 shall sustain the presiding officer (See Rule 29.4). Any delegate who raises a 1088 point of order shall cite the rule believed to have been violated. 1089

(2) At the discretion of the presiding officer, a time for prayerful discernment may be
 taken during deliberation. Such a time should be for group personal meditation
 and or for group prayer and shall end at the call of the presiding officer, at which
 time normal deliberation shall be resumed.

(3) The presiding officer shall have the right to recess a session of the body at any
 time at the presiding officer's discretion and to reconvene at such time as the
 presiding officer shall announce propose. Consistent with the spirit of ¶721 of the
 Book of Discipline, in rare circumstances the presiding officer shall also have the

right to stipulate that the session shall reconvene in closed session with only

delegates, authorized personnel, and authorized guests permitted to attend such asession following recess (See Section VII.F.1.).

1102 Rule 4. Calling the Conference to Order

When the presiding officer calls the body to order, no delegate shall speak, address thechair, or stand.

III. Rights and Duties of Delegates

1108 Rule 5. Attendance and Seating Reserves

The chairperson of each delegation shall be provided with a form on which to report daily 1109 the attendance of its delegates. Any reserve seated in the place of a regular delegate shall 1110 have been duly elected as a reserve delegate by the Annual Conference and shall meet the 1111 requirements set forth in the Book of Discipline ¶34-36. Delegates, including reserves 1112 when the latter are substituted for a delegate or delegates, shall be seated in the order of 1113 their election, except when a reserve is seated temporarily or in case of special need as 1114 determined by the delegation chairperson. The reserve shall occupy the seat of the 1115 delegate for whom the substitution is made. Reserves shall not be seated for delegates 1116 presenting on the platform. All delegates arriving after the opening roll call shall be 1117 1118 reported by the chairperson of the delegation to the secretary of the General Conference or designee. Committee on Credentials (See section VII.A.4. See also Book of 1119 *Discipline* ¶506 defining a Quorum.) No delegate, unless hindered by sickness or other 1120 1121 emergency, shall be absent from the sessions of the Conference without permission of the Conference. All absences shall be reported by the chairpersons of the delegations to the 1122 1123 secretary of the General Conference or designee Committee on Credentials on a form provided for this purpose. Reserve delegates are to function within the Rules of 1124 Procedure of the General Conference (See Rules 27 and 31). A reserve delegate may be 1125 seated upon authority of the chairperson of the delegation who shall report the 1126

- substitution in writing to the secretary of the General Conference or designee Committee
- ¹¹²⁸ on Credentials on a form provided for this purpose. Reserves are chosen to be seated:
- (1) by reason of being of the same order as the absent delegate,
- 1130 (2) in order of their election as reserve delegates.
- 1131 If the substitution is challenged, the Committee on Credentials disapproves the
- ¹¹³² substitution, after consultation with the chairperson of the delegation, it may report its
- recommendation to the General Conference. The chairperson of the Committee on
- 1134 Credentials shall make a daily written report to the Secretary of the General Conference,
- 1135 listing all changes of seating (See Section IA.4 and VII.A.4).

- 1137 Rule 6. Directions for Securing the Plenary Floor

1138 A delegate desiring to speak to the Conference shall hold up the appropriate placard to be

recognized by the bishop presiding. Unless raising a point of order or parliamentary

inquiry, the delegate shall not speak until given the floor. The bishop presiding shall

1141 consider the various sections of the auditorium in rotation. The delegate recognized shall

1142 proceed to the nearest microphone and shall first announce her or his name and the name

of the conference represented, which in turn the bishop presiding shall then announce to

the Conference. A delegate recognized by the presiding bishop may not yield the floor to
another delegate.

1147 Rule 7. Plenary Speakers For and Against

(1) When the report of a committee is under consideration, it shall be the duty of the
bishop presiding to ascertain, when recognizing a delegate to the Conference, on

which side the delegate proposes to speak; the bishop presiding shall not assign
the floor to any delegate proposing to speak on the same side of the pending
question as the speaker immediately preceding if any delegate desires to speak on
the other side.

- (2) Except for non-debatable motions (Rule 21), no report shall be adopted or
 question relating to the same decided, without opportunity having been given for
 at least two speeches for and two against the said proposal.
- (3) The motion to call for the previous question, which is itself non-debatable, is not 1157 in order without opportunity having been given for until there have been at least 1158 two speeches for and two against the proposal. Any delegate who moves the 1159 previous question (that is, that the vote be now taken on the motion or motions 1160 pending) shall also indicate to what it is intended to apply, if any secondary 1161 motion or motions are also pending. If said delegate does not so indicate, it shall 1162 1163 be regarded as applying only to the immediately pending question. This motion shall be taken without debate and shall require a two-thirds vote of those present 1164 and voting for its adoption. If it is adopted, the vote shall be taken on the motion 1165 or motions to which it applies without further debate (See Rule 21). After three 1166 speeches for and three against and provided no secondary motions come before 1167 the floor, the questions shall be put automatically. However, the chairperson 1168 and/or duly authorized delegate or delegates presenting the committee's report, 1169 and if there is a minority report, the presenter shall be entitled to speak before the 1170 vote is taken (See Rule 27). These speeches shall be limited to three (3) minutes 1171 (See Rule 9). 1172

1174	Rule 8. Interrupting the Speaker
1175	No delegate who has the floor may be interrupted except for a point of order, a
1176	parliamentary inquiry, a point of information, to challenge a misrepresentation, or to call
1177	attention that the time has arrived for an order of the day.
1178	
1179	Rule 9. Speaking More Than Once; Length of Speech
1180	(1) No delegate shall speak a second time on the same question if any delegate who
1181	has not previously spoken on the question desires the floor.
1182	(2) No delegate shall speak more than twice on the same subject under the same
1183	motion, except as provided in Rule 7.2
1184	(3) No delegate shall speak longer than three minutes unless that time is extended by
1185	the body (See Rule 7.3). Time of translation shall not count against the three
1186	minute limit.
1187	(4) The three-minute limit on delegate speeches may be amended by a majority vote
1188	of the body at any time and for any period of duration.
1189	
1190	Rule 10. Point of Order
1191	A delegate wishing to raise a point of order shall address the presiding officer and say, "I
1192	rise to a point of order." The presiding officer shall interrupt the proceeding. If a
1193	delegate is speaking, that one shall immediately yield the floor. The presiding officer
1194	shall then direct the delegate raising the point of order to state the point as briefly and

concisely as possible, citing the rule invoked in the point of order. The delegate shall not

1196	presume to decide the question or argue the point. A point of order is decided by the
1197	presiding officer without debate unless in doubtful cases the presiding officer submits the
1198	question to the body for advice or decision. When the presiding officer rules on a point,
1199	debate is closed, but the decision may be appealed (See Rule 3).
1200	
1201	Rule 11. Bar of the Conference
1202	The bar of the conference shall provide for the integrity of the General Conference. It is
1203	for delegates, pages, and others who have been granted access to the area for General
1204	Conference business as provided through the Rules or through the suspension of the
1205	Rules. Delegates are not to distract others near them by engaging in unrelated business
1206	activity.
1207	
1208	Rule 12. Distracting Behavior
1209	Delegates are not to distract others near them by engaging in activities unrelated to the
1210	matters at hand. Audible cell-phone use is not permitted in the plenary hall or the
1211	legislative committee rooms by delegates or observers while in session. All electronic
1212	devices shall be muted or turned off. In addition, the use of laptop computers, personal
1213	digital assistants, pagers and other electronic devices should be in furtherance of General
1214	Conference business and done in such a manner that it does not disturb other participants.
1215	The presiding officer or members of the General Conference staff may ask individuals to

- 1216 leave the plenary hall or the legislative committee room if they persist in behavior that
- 1217 interferes with the participation of other delegates. All electronic devices should have
- 1218 audible alarms muted when possible.

1220 Rule 13. Electronic Recording

1221 No electronic recording by either video or voice may be made of any portion of the

1222 General Conference unless specifically authorized by the Business Manager of the

1223 General Conference in order to maintain the integrity of all performance licenses.

1225 Rule 14. Right to Make Motions

1226 Only voting delegates have the right to make or second motions in accordance with the

rules and upon recognition by the presiding officer.

1229 Rule 15. Plenary Voting Procedure

1230 (1) Voting shall be by electronic means unless otherwise ordered by the Conference,

provided, however, that in elections, voting may be by written ballot. Electronic

- voting devices shall be available on the platform for delegates making a

 written ballot may be ordered on call of any delegate, supported by one-third of
